Ottawa, 7 May 2026 – The Navan Lions Club held a reception on the 7th May at the Navan Curling Club to thank people who have given their time as well as their money to support them and their activities. Many activities carried out by the Navan Lions would not be possible if it were not for the support they receive from the community at large. Their fundraising efforts organizing their annual curling bonspiel and golf tournament, help to support many organizations, including the Lions Foundation of Canada Dog Guides, Make-A-Wish Canada, the Canadian Pulmonary Fibrosis Foundation, the food bank at the Orleans-Cumberland Community Resource Centre, to name only a few. The Navan Lions are on pace again this year to donate more than 50K for a second consecutive year.

As the honorary speaker, Councillor Catherine Kitts took to the podium to speak about the importance of volunteerism and how the Navan Lions have been a driving force in shaping their community for the past 74 years. Other dignitaries included Jim and Renee Devenny, the District Governor and Past District Governor within a district serving Eastern Ontario and Western Quebec.

The Navan Lions also took the opportunity to present Doctor David Grattan with a Melvin Jones Fellowship. David now becomes the 13th person to receive such honors from the Navan Lions Club.

The Melvin Jones Fellowship is a recognition of a commitment to humanitarian work and is made possible by a donation made by the Navan Lions Club to the Lions Club International Foundation. The fellowship is the foundation's highest honor and represents humanitarian qualities such as generosity, compassion, and concern for the less fortunate.

Those who have received this award from the Navan Lions Club, were thought to be most effective in supporting their local community and upholding the mission of Lionism, which is to serve.

David Grattan has served in the Navan Lions Club for more than 20 years and has been an integral part of his community during that time. According to the President of the Navan Lions Club, Tony Fiorentino:

"David has made our meetings and gatherings a lot more fun with his zany, one-of-a-kind costumes and his wonderful sense of humour. We are proud to include David as a member and we hope he will continue to inspire us all for a very long time."

Also at a recent Lions meeting there was a fascinating presentation given by Wendy McHenry of the Ottawa John Howard Society. I suspect that many of us are unaware of the activities and important role this society performs in our city. It was a fascinating presentation. The John Howard Society of Ottawa is a not-for-profit, charitable organization committed to providing a broad range of community services throughout the Ottawa area. The organization has a strong history of helping individuals, and families, who are at risk of, or have come into, conflict with the law. Our work includes the provision of prevention and intervention services, as well as advocacy, public education, and community partnerships. Named after an 18th century prison reformer, the society has existed for over 70 years. It Started out as nonprofit to assist the integration of released prisoners into the community. It has grown, in the Ottawa office alone there are now 300 people on staff. Its main focus is to assist men and women that are at risk of being involved with the law or who are actually involved with the law. The society's scope of activities is impressive: it includes the following Preventing and intervention, Youth housing, Services in Court and Detention, Community reintegration, Housing Supports, Adult residential programs, Community integration, Employment services.

About the Navan Lions Club

The Navan Lions Club was inaugurated in 1952 with a strong emphasis on sight-related programs. . Over the years, the Club has organized a number of fundraising events in order to support local organizations and people in need. The Club has approximately 20 active members, who generally meet twice monthly. The Club helps support a number of local organizations such as the Orleans- Cumberland Community Resource Centre and the Lions Foundation of Canada Dog Guides. In 2027, the Navan Lions Club will celebrate 75 years serving their community.

NAVAN NOTABLES

Don Macartney



If there is a community service exercise happening in Navan, you can usually find Don Macartney helping out in some fashion, usually attired in his gold Lion's Club vest. He is a man of many interests who is ably assisted in most of his ventures by Susan, his spouse of 51 years. Don and Susan have lived in Navan since 1988. They are parents to two sons, Richard and David, and have one grand-child and two great-grand-children. Don confesses that his five-year-old great grand-daughter "Jasmine" has him "wrapped around her little finger." It is beyond the scope of this article to list all of Don's numerous community activities over the years. Many of them arise out of his membership at Navan-Vars United Church (N-VUC) where he has sung in the choir since 1988. For many years he was the congregation's representative at the Ottawa Presbytery, a United Church body that oversaw local congregations and their ministry personnel. He is currently half-way through a three-year term as Chair of Council (i.e. the head honcho) at N-VUC. For 14 years, under the auspices of N-VUC, he has led the Navan Moonlighters Team at the Coldest Night of the Year fund-raiser. In February of each year, teams from across the City seek pledges from supporters and walk through frosty winter conditions to raise funds for Jericho Road and Capital City Ministries, two related organizations which facilitate faith-based approaches to dismantling the stigma of substance abuse, aiming to create a society that fully integrates those with substance use disorder. Over the 14 years that Don has been spear-heading this at N-VUC the Moonlighters have raised \$60,000. This year, the team was the largest in Ottawa and it raised over \$8,000, the most it had ever raised in a single year. In large part, this was due to Don recruiting some new members from St. Mary's Anglican Church in Navan, Don Clysdale, Neil Blaney, and Mark O'Donahue. Don, Neil and Mark are also members of the Ottawa Carleton Men's Choir in which Don has been performing for about 5 years. Talk about classic Navan cross-pollination!

Don is a long-time member of the Navan Lion's Club. He served as President during the Covid years when, as he puts

it, "fund-raising was a real challenge, but we survived." Eight years ago, Don inaugurated an annual Lion's golf tournament in support of the "Make A Wish Foundation" and other local charities. It is still going strong, now under the guidance of wife Susan, with Don spear-heading sponsorship. Since its inception it has raised approximately \$45,000.

When I spoke to Don for background for this article, he was quick to remind me that "[he does not] do any of this alone." By way of illustration he talked about another recent accomplishment, the reorganization of the Honours and Awards Program for the 62 clubs in Lion's A4 with the help of David and Rachel Gratton to whom he says most of the credit should go. Despite his modesty, I say "Hats off to Don" for all he has done for Navan and area. Folks like him are the backbone of this community.

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A NOTE FROM COUNCILLOR CATHERINE KITTS

As summer gets underway, there's no shortage of reasons to get out and enjoy everything Navan has to offer. Music in the Park is back, the Original Navan Market is in full swing, and we're getting closer to the Navan Fair, all made possible by the incredible volunteers who help bring these events to life. I'd also like to congratulate the NCA and Shelley Cotton on a fantastic Touch-A-Truck event, which brought so many families together for a fun and educational day.

Many residents have reached out about the white "X" road markings and drone activity spotted throughout rural Ward 19. After extensive follow-up, I confirmed this work was related to the federal Alto high-speed rail project. While I had initially been advised in writing that the activity was unrelated to Alto, we later learned a contractor was conducting survey work on its behalf. I was frustrated to discover municipal roads had been marked without advance notice and equally concerned by the conflicting information provided throughout the process. I formally wrote to both the Minister of Transportation and CEO of Alto making it clear that future work on municipal property must involve proper notification and engagement with the City and affected communities. While the project remains under federal jurisdiction, residents deserve transparency, accountability, and clear communication every step of the way. We have since been made aware that additional field studies, including drone surveys, were starting as early as May 25 and continuing through the end of 2026. Alto has indicated these studies are intended to support environmental and engineering analysis, do not represent a finalized route decision, and that any requests for private property access will be voluntary. I fully appreciate residents continue to have many questions about the project. Alto remains the best source for project-specific information: questions@altotrain.ca

Meanwhile, construction season is fully underway. Residents will notice reduced speed limit signs around the Navan/Milton roundabout to support construction safety and protect workers. While these are temporary construction measures, it is important to note that speeds will ultimately be reduced to 60 km/hr on the approaches to the roundabout once the project is complete. Also note that sections of Trim Road and Navan Road are scheduled for rehabilitation this year as part of the City's 2026 Road Rehabilitation Program.

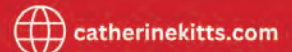
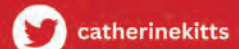
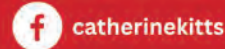

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CABINET MAKERS CORNER

One of the most important aspects of cabinet makers are their tools and their workspace. In my workshop I have a panel saw, table saws, edge bander machine, CNC machine, and many more smaller hand tools and milling machines. Lets take about the roll that all these machine/ tools play in the shop.

The Panel saw is able to handle 5x10 sheets. This saw is designed for the table to move on a slider so that the operator does not need to push the material through the blade. It makes very accurate and repeatable cuts. It is equipped with a scoring blade which is a smaller blade to score the underside of the material and help to prevent chips on both surfaces.

In the shop we have 2 table saws. One has a wood cutting blade for solid wood materials and the other has a dado stack blade. The dado stack is used to make grooves of any width in the materials (mainly as a joinery technique) We use the table saws for rip cuts (lengthwise cuts) and the panel saw or a mitre saw is used for cross cut saws (cuts pieces to length)

The edge bander is very specific for cabinet shop. It's a large machine that's sole purpose is to apply edge banding to sheet goods. This includes PVC edging for most melamine material, wood veneer edging for wood veneers and also solid wood edge for veneers. It will glue, apply, trim, and polish the edge all in one 8' line of tools. These machines save lots of time but can be tricky to operate. The CNC machine, which stands for Computer numerical control. This is basically a computer controlled router. It has the ability to do most of the cutting and shaping operations in the shop. These machines are becoming more and more common as programs to run them become more user friendly and the cost of the machines goes down. We use this machine to cut our cabinet pieces and drawers. It is also used for signs or architectural panels. These are very versatile machine that are really only limited by the operators knowledge of the software and the machine itself.

The workspace in a cabinet shop is very important as well. Lots of space is required as cabinets tend to take up room once assembled. We have a cutting/assembly area, probably 2/3 of the shop and then we have a staging area 1/3 of the shop. Once cabinets have been cut and assembled we move them to the staging area where we assemble as much of the project as possible. (Before the project gets finished) This helps us to catch any measurement errors or missing pieces, insuring that the install onsite goes smoothly. This area of the shop is very fluid, sometimes full of cabinets and sometimes empty if we've just done an installation onsite.





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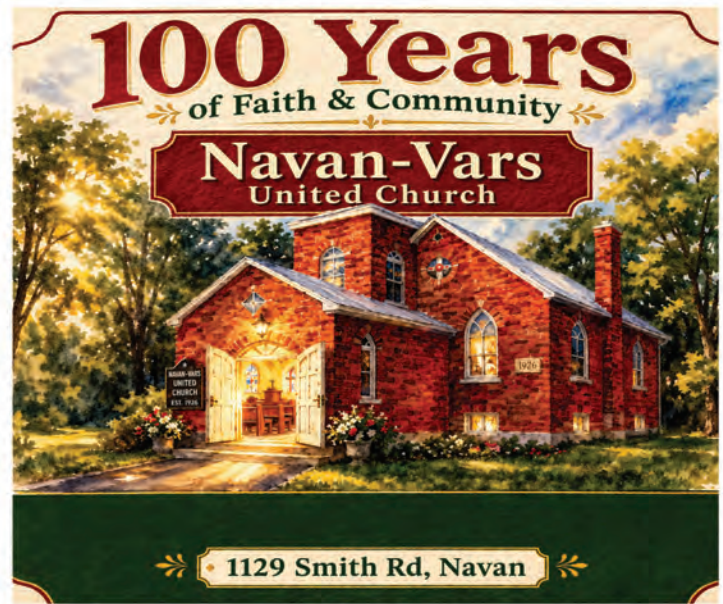

Local Teen Excels in Para Sport, Wins Medals

The Ottawa Carleton Wheelchair Sports Association (OCWSA) has been around for 50 years. The Royals are the sole team in Ottawa and have a mini team and an adult team. They are the only Ontario team playing in the Para Sports Wheelchair Basketball League in Quebec. A Navan teenager, Hunter Murdock has been playing in the league



since 2022. Recently, his team won its first medal in the Provincial finals held in Sherbrooke, Quebec where they placed second. Hunter also won the leagues award for best defensive player of the year. In April, the Royals attended the National finals in Edmonton where they won bronze. This was the first time that mini teams have been invited to

the National finals. The teams attending were from British Columbia, Alberta, Saskatchewan, Manitoba and Ontario. The Royals played against all unfamiliar opponents but fared well! In May, Hunter and the Royals played in the Quebec league end of year tournament in Montreal where the team won silver. During the tournament, Hunter also played for the adult team with two other minis teammates. Hunter's shooting and scoring has improved steadily this year. He was able to score several points in the adult league where the game is faster and more competitive. The league accepts players with disabilities as well as able bodied individuals. It takes a considerable amount of skill, co-ordination and physical effort to roll the chair, dribble and shoot. Those without wheelchairs, wishing to try the sport may use one of several chairs provided by the Royals at their practices. It is much harder than it looks! The sport is popular but more players are needed and welcome! The Ottawa Royals mini and adult team practice on Tuesday nights at Carleton University in the Ice House. 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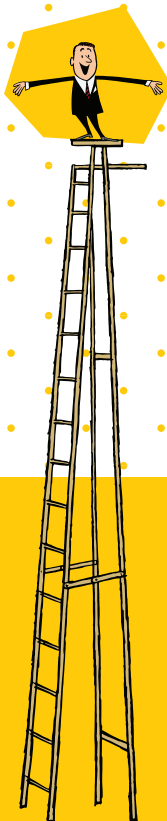
